Dear FPC Denton Church Family,
Pentecost Sunday is on May 19 th . I thought I'd share a little from a devotional:
Text: John 20:22: "[Jesus] breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit" Reflection: "On the day of his resurrection, Jesus does what God did when Adam was created. God breathed into a human body, made from the dust of the ground, and a "living being" came into existence (Genesis 2: 7). Jesus breathes on his disciples, and the church, the Body of the risen Lord, comes into existence. On Pentecost, fifty days later, the Holy Spirit descends on those same disciples with a sound "like a strong driving wind," enabling them to proclaim the Good News. God is breath, wind, spirit. Breath, however, may be the most compelling way of speaking of the ultimately unknowable One who spoke to Moses from a burning bush and whose name in Hebrew is yod he vav he or transliterated into English as YHWH. When joined to vowels, the name God revealed to Moses can be pronounced "Yahweh." It is usually interpreted to mean something like "the One who is" or "I AM". Another explanation of the meaning of these consonants comes from the way they would sound by themselves--perhaps something like the sound of inhaling and exhaling. God's name, in other words, might simply be the sound of breathing. God is the Breath of Life. God is the Breathing Spirit of the World. We say, "I breathe," but it might be more accurate to say "I am breathed" or "my breath is God breathing in me." Breathing is really not something we do; it is something that happens of itself, usually without our being conscious of it. In a similar way, we are in God and God in us even when we don't notice it or think about it. How great is that! Prayer: "Breathe on me, Breath of God, fill me with life anew, that I may love the way you love, and do what you would do." (Breathe on Me, Breath of God hymn). Doug's Weekly Words on the recent Mission trip to Guatemala—with Katherine Mehaffey

Greetings friends,

At 1 Wednesday AM our team of FPC ambassadors got home from Guatemala. It was a rich and full week. We were able to get a very clear picture of the situation in Chitul. We met with their key leaders, the FH staff, and were able to enter into the homes of all the kids the 10 of us sponsored. We were able to see clearly how important the relationship with our church to this community is as we were welcomed and sent off with two well coordinated community events. As well we were able to see the health of the church that ministers to this community. We are excited to share this experience with the church body, we plan to share more in depth on Cinco de Mayo, May 5th after the church service. I am aware that Cinco de Mayo has nothing to do with Guatemala, but it was the most logical Sunday and I can't miss the chance to share the most common Spanish phrase in our culture. Here is a little taste of some of what we will be sharing:

One of the things we did every night is ask the question, "Where did you experience God today?" It was an easy question to answer every night, and it was an encouragement to hear where others saw God. Here is the reality though....I don't think God is more active in Guatemala than God is in Bellingham. I just think we are less aware of it. When we're out of the country, we were looking and open to God on the move. God though, is on the move all around us. We tend to get so caught up in the mundane elements of doing life that we are in the habit of missing it.

I was asked Monday to offer a devotion for the FH (Food for the Hungry) Staff. As we met with this staff of 50 here was what I was lead to share Since it was Eastertide I spoke on the Emmaus Road story in Luke 24. One of my favorite resurrection appearances. I focused on the part of the passage:

13 Now on that same day two of them were going to a village call Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, 14 and talking with each other about all these things that had happened. 15 While they were talking and discussing, Jesus himself came near and went with them, 16 but their eyes were kept from recognizing him. 17 And he said to them. "What are you discussing with each other while you walk along?" They stood still, looking sad.



Here is the part of the passage that I have never noticed until it was pointed out to me this year by my friend Susan Philips. The disciples are walking along talking about important things, working on matters of the day. Jesus comes near to them... but they do not recognize him....Then the mic drop moment in verse 17— they stood still...other versions say the stopped. This feels so significant to me. I wonder what would have happened had they not stopped and stood still. Maybe we would be without one of the great resurrection appearances of the gospels.

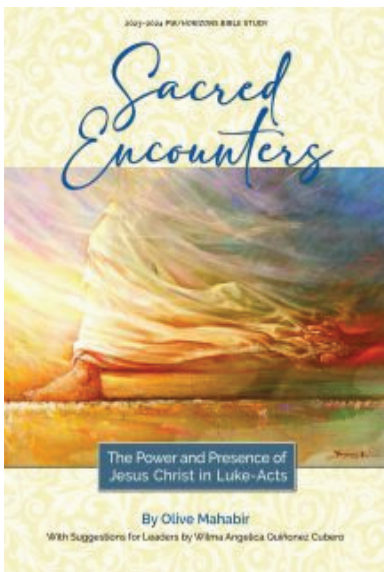
One of the blessings of a trip like the one we just took... it has an element of standing still. We are away from our daily chores and to-do lists. As we stood still, we began to see how near Jesus truly is. We were able to sit in the goodness that is Jesus, even amidst a place of poverty and injustice. Especially there. We saw Jesus all around us, at work in ways we might have missed if we hadn't stopped...Then we shared it with our fellow pilgrims. It was holy ground.

Right now, stand still. Don't do something, just stand there. Breathe in, do it again. What can you notice? Where is God in this moment right now? How is Jesus drawing near? Now do that again later on...and again. Keep stopping, keep returning...If you notice something, figure out a way to share it with your fellow pilgrims.

I wonder if one of the reason that we do not recognize Jesus at work amongst us is our constant busyness. Our deep sense of responsibility. My charge to our performance oriented souls—stop...Stand still. This is the life of the Benedictines. Work hard, then stop seven times a day to pray and worship. Work, then stop and stand still. Word and stop. Eat together and then sleep. Wake and repeat...It is an ancient and powerful prescription for spiritual formation. Jesus is drawing near to us...

Let us pay attention

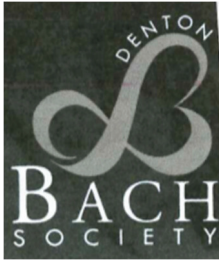

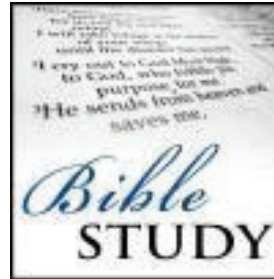

Green Rice (page 104)

- 2 c. rice, cooked in chicken broth
- 1 beaten egg
- $\frac{3}{4}$ c. milk
- $\frac{1}{2}$ c. cheese, grated
- 1 Tbsp. grated onion
- $1\frac{1}{4}$ tsp. salt
- $\frac{1}{3}$ c. chopped parsley
- 1 box frozen chopped spinach, thawed
- 1 Tbsp. Worcestershire
- $\frac{1}{4}$ c. melted butter



Combine all ingredients in greased baking dish. Bake at 375° for 45 minutes. Serves 6.

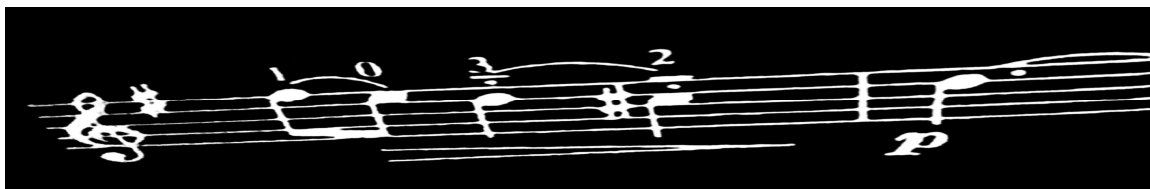

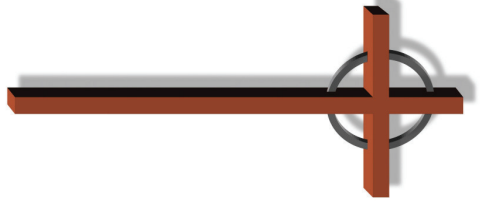
